GENERAL RULES & CONDITIONS FOR COMPETITORS

ENTRIES: Entry forms complete with all particulars and entry fees must be lodged with the Convenor on or before Friday the 2nd August 2024.

<u>COMPETITORS</u>. These competitions are open to amateurs whose regular income is not derived mainly from the exercise of his or her talents in the particular section in which he or she is competing.

<u>A NOVICE</u>. Is a competitor who has never won a first prize as a solo competitor in any previous competitions in his/her current age group.

AGE LIMIT. A competitor's age is reckoned as at the first day of the month that the competitions take place. Every competitor, when called on to do so, must satisfy the Committee of his or her age, or be disqualified.

<u>CUPS AND TROPHIES.</u> Must be returned (*Cleaned*) by Friday 2nd August 2024 to the convenor's postal address. If not returned by the due date, a fine of \$10 will be imposed. All trophy winners are responsible for the engraving of their names. Trophies are held for one year.

<u>TIES.</u> If two competitors tie for first place, the prize money for first and second shall be combined and divided equally.

<u>PRIZES.</u> In addition to monetary prizes and trophies where specified, certificates will be issued for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places. *Prize money may vary from the amount stated on the syllabus depending annual sponsorship.*

<u>ORDER OF APPEARANCE</u>. Competitor's names appear in the programme in the order in which they will be called upon to perform. All competitors must be in attendance *15 minutes* before the class commences.

PROTEST. Any competitor desiring to protest, must do so in writing, setting out the grounds, and lodge it with the Secretary together with \$10 as a guarantee of bona fide. Should the committee, after investigation, deem the protest to be frivolous or unfounded, the deposit will be forfeited. No protest will be considered unless lodged within 24 hours after the results have been announced. No protest can be made against any decision of the adjudicator.

<u>ADJUDICATOR</u>. No competitor, teacher or interested party, other than the committee, shall have contact with the adjudicator during classes.

REPEATS. No item performed in one class may be performed in another.

<u>MUSIC.</u> Must be available for the adjudicator at least 15 minutes before the commencement of the class. It must be handed in at the Music Table, and be clearly marked with the class number, competitor's name and competitor number.

There must be at least ONE original copy of the music at the Competition venue for every item performed.

OTAGO DAILY TIMES SOUTHERN ARIA CONTEST

A brief description of the characters, operas and the aria's context, **must accompany the entry form.** Failure to do so will result in disqualification. No previous winner may enter the Aria Competition.

<u>TIME LIMIT</u>. There will be a time limit of 5 minutes for all own choice items, except where a special time limit is specified.

<u>SUBDIVIDING.</u> The committee reserves the right to subdivide classes after entries have been received, if class numbers make the class unwieldy.

SPECIAL PRIZES. Special prizes will not be awarded if fewer than three competitors perform, except at the discretion of the Adjudicator. The Adjudicator has the right to withhold prizes if a suitable standard is not attained.

<u>**DRESS.**</u> It is expected that all performers will be dressed in a manner suitable for their performance. Please note that formal dress is required for both competitors and accompanists for the final night of the Senior Vocal Festival.

REPORTS. Report sheets will be available from the secretary's table at the end of each session

NO ENTRIES will be accepted from students taught by the Adjudicator in this and the previous year.

Adjudicator. Deborah Wai Kapohe (Christchurch)



Born in Southland, New Zealand, Deborah has performed in operas, musical theatre, contemporary Māori music, arts festivals, proms, concerts, recitals, self-accompanied guitar and voice recitals, and special events throughout New Zealand and Australia, as well as in the UK, Asia Pacific Region, and South Africa.

Deborah was fortunate to study voice with the late Beatrice Webster, who was a pupil of Lucie Manèn. After studying with Mrs. Webster, Deborah studied for a year with the Young Artists Program of Opera Australia in 1994. Twelve years later, Deborah refreshed her voice with a Master of Music in 2006 at the University of Otago under the supervision of Ms. Cunningham (also a pupil of Mrs. Webster) and Professor Terence Dennis.

Deborah's traditional operatic and musical theatre roles include Lily in The Secret Garden (Ascot Group New Zealand Tour), Pamina in The Magic Flute (Opera Australia and Wellington Opera), Mimi in La Boheme (New Zealand Opera), Papagena (OZ Opera tour of NSW, VIC, TAS, WA, and NT) Rosalinde in Die Fledermaus (Whanganui Opera), Sophie in Massenet's Werther (Beijing International Arts Festival), Adalgisa in Norma (Canterbury Opera), Nannetta in Falstaff (New Zealand Opera), Cherubino in The Marriage of Figaro (Canterbury Opera), Leila in The Pearl Fishers (New Zealand Opera), Marguerite in Faust (Hong Kong), Carmen (University of Otago Alumni Opera) and Euridice / Eurydice in Orfeo / Orpheus / (m)Orpheus (New Zealand Opera).

Deborah's Premiere Opera performances include Outrageous Fortune by New Zealand composer Gillian Whitehead; Wide Sargasso Sea and Gauguin for Chamber Made, Melbourne, Australia; Grandma's Shoes, a joint production between Opera Australia and Theatre of Image in Sydney, Jan 2000, Matthew Suttor's Opera Trial of the Cannibal Dog at the 2008 New Zealand International Arts Festival and the role of Te Rai in NBR New Zealand Opera's production of Hōhepa at the 2012 New Zealand International Arts Festival.

Special events include singing for The Duke of Edinburgh World Fellows at St James Palace and Buckingham Palace, Cathcart Spring proms at the Royal Albert Hall, the Sydney and Beijing

Olympic Arts Festivals (New Zealand Symphony Orchestra), <u>National Anthems for the All Blacks and the Silver Ferns in New Zealand and Australia</u> and for Royalty at Huka Lodge.

Deborah's discography includes recordings with the <u>New Zealand Symphony Orchestra</u>, <u>Pianist David Harper</u>, Elena (<u>Shanghai International Arts Festival</u>), and STRIKE. She has written four albums of <u>singer-songwriter material</u>.

In 2010 Deborah graduated with a Bachelor of Laws with Honours at the University of Sydney Law School in Sydney, Australia. Meanwhile, she continued her singing by performing in Beijing with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra. From 2012 until 2018, Deborah returned to her ancestral home of Whanganui to work as the Arts Adviser for the Whanganui District Council. During this time, she developed her arts management skills for events, funding and facilitating multi-discipline cross collaboration as well as performing with the New Zealand Opera School, concert, and event work, and developing her self-accompanied recitals through the study and use of historic guitars.

In 2019, Deborah completed the New Zealand Legal Practice Examination and the Legal Professional Studies Certificate. In 2021, she was admitted to the Bar.

During the pandemic, Deborah returned to studying singing, focusing on developing her skills in the Old Italian Method. This re-focusing has had a profound effect on her singing and philosophy for her work as an emerging teacher. She also became a member of both NEWZATS and IRMTNZ and performed regularly in South Africa and New Zealand. These performances included Cabaret, Recital, and Concert work.

Engagements in 2022 as a soloist included performing a diverse range of genres, including Christchurch City Choir (Classical), *Te Tairāwhiti Arts Festival 202*2 (Crossover), *Aotearoa New Zealand International Festival of the Arts (Crossover)*, *Auckland Arts Festival (Crossover)*, *Orchestra Wellington (Schumman's Dichterlieber rescored for Jazz Vocalist)*, and performing with *Pandemonium* (Classical).

In 2022, Deborah also completed her Post Graduate Diploma of Creative Practice degree at ARA Institute of Canterbury in exploring what can be learned about the tikanga of songwriting with mātauranga Māori through the use of Tāonga Pūoro (Traditional Māori instruments).

Engagements in 2023 included performing Rutter's *Magnificat* and Vaughan Williams's *Serenade to Music* with the Christchurch City Choir, performing with renowned Jazz Vocalist, Naomi Ferguson, and, as a special guest with UK comedian Bill Bailey's new show *Thoughtifier*. In September 2023, Deborah performed the role of Euridice with NZ Opera and Black Grace in their production of Gluck's *Orfeo* which was renamed (m)Orpheus. In December 2023, Deborah finished the year by performing Gareth Farr's *Ngā Tai Hurihuri* for the Sarjeant Gallery Te Whare o Rehua at the Royal Whanganui Opera House as well as soloist for the Christchurch City Council Civic Awards Ceremony.
